Who can stand for election?

City of Glasgow College students currently enrolled at college (excluding evening/weekend leisure courses) can stand for election if they are: over the age of 16, are eligible to work in the UK and can commit to working up to 35 hours a week.

The role of Student President is a full time paid position - this means that you can stand even if you are about to finish college this year.

If you are applying for a part time Vice President position there are a few other rules:

- You must be progressing to the next level of your course or starting a new course in academic year 2020-21.
- Your course must be running throughout the entire academic year 2020-21.

You may only stand for one position in the elections and successful applicants will be subject to a satisfactory PVG Disclosure Check.

What do I need to do?

It's easy, just follow these steps:

- 1. Decide which role you would like to stand for
- 2. Write a manifesto about why you should be elected and what you would do for students, there is further guidance on the last page of this pack.
- 3. Go to **www.citysa.co.uk** to complete an online application form and submit your manifesto
- 4. Once uploaded you will be asked to complete the elections consent form and submit a flyer design you can see an example here.

Guidance for submitting your Manifesto, Photo & Flyer Design

- 1. Your Manifesto should be no more than 250 words and detail why you are running for election as well as why students should vote for you. We have created a full guide on how to write a Manifesto which can be accessed through our elections page on the website.
- 2. Photos submitted to your nomination form should be a clear portrait shot of yourself against a neutral background (avoid images from events, nights out, etc.) to allow student to easily identify you at point of voting. High quality photos will be taken of candidates at Candidate Briefings which we would recommend using.
- 3. All Flyers must meet City of Glasgow College accessibility requirements. A full guide on creating an elections flyer including accessibility information can be found on our elections page.

Once you have returned your nomination form

- 1. The Students' Association will check the manifesto, photo and flyer you submit to ensure that the content is acceptable and meets accessibility criteria.
- 2. Staff will arrange for 250 A5 flyers to be printed to help you campaign when voting starts.
- 3. Candidates will have a small budget of £40 for buying additional campaigning materials (this can include additional flyers). Candidates must ensure that this money is spent appropriately and provide receipts to reclaim their money.
